NCCSAH to meet in Grass Valley and Nevada City

The Northern California Chapter of the Society of Architectural Historians will meet on Saturday, November 1, 1997, in the Gold Rush towns of Grass Valley and Nevada City. We will convene, at the Empire Mine State Historic Park. The site is one of the largest and richest hard rock gold mines in California. First mined in 1850, the operation finally closed in 1956. The Empire Cottage and other buildings on the site were designed circa 1895 by Bay Area architect, Willis Polk for mine owner William Bourn, Jr.

The group will meet in the Polk designed clubhouse, hear several presentations, and tour the stone cottage and site. If the weather holds we will lunch on the patio. After lunch and the business meeting we will head up Highway 49 for a short drive to Nevada City where we will tour the National Register Historic District, rich in 19th century history and architecture. Our guide for this part of the day will be Ed Tyson, a well known Nevada City historian.

We will end the day with wine and dinner!

In San Francisco, the preservation community has continued to monitor the actions of the Landmarks Board. The controversy over the murals in the old Public Library in the Civic Center continues. The city is still in search of funds for work on the Conservatory of Flowers in Golden Gate Park. Lastly, the fate of the old Emporium building near Union Square and several school buildings of the San Francisco Unified School District is still undecided.

In Palo Alto, a moratorium on demolition permits for residences was enacted in the past year. This action resulted in the city hiring a consultant to survey the historic resources within the city limits for future planning purposes.
